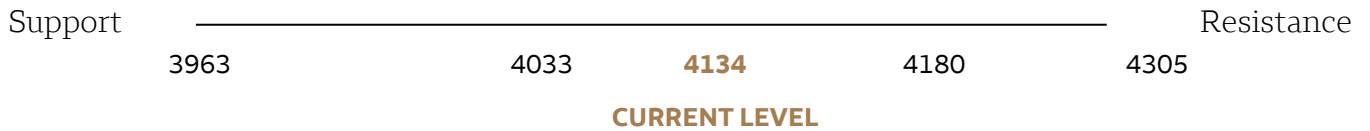
S&P 500 Index

The S&P 500 Index (4134) is in an uptrend. We believe the next areas to watch for resistance will be the recent highs (4180, 4305). Support should be found at the 50-day moving average (4033), followed by the 200-day moving average (3963).



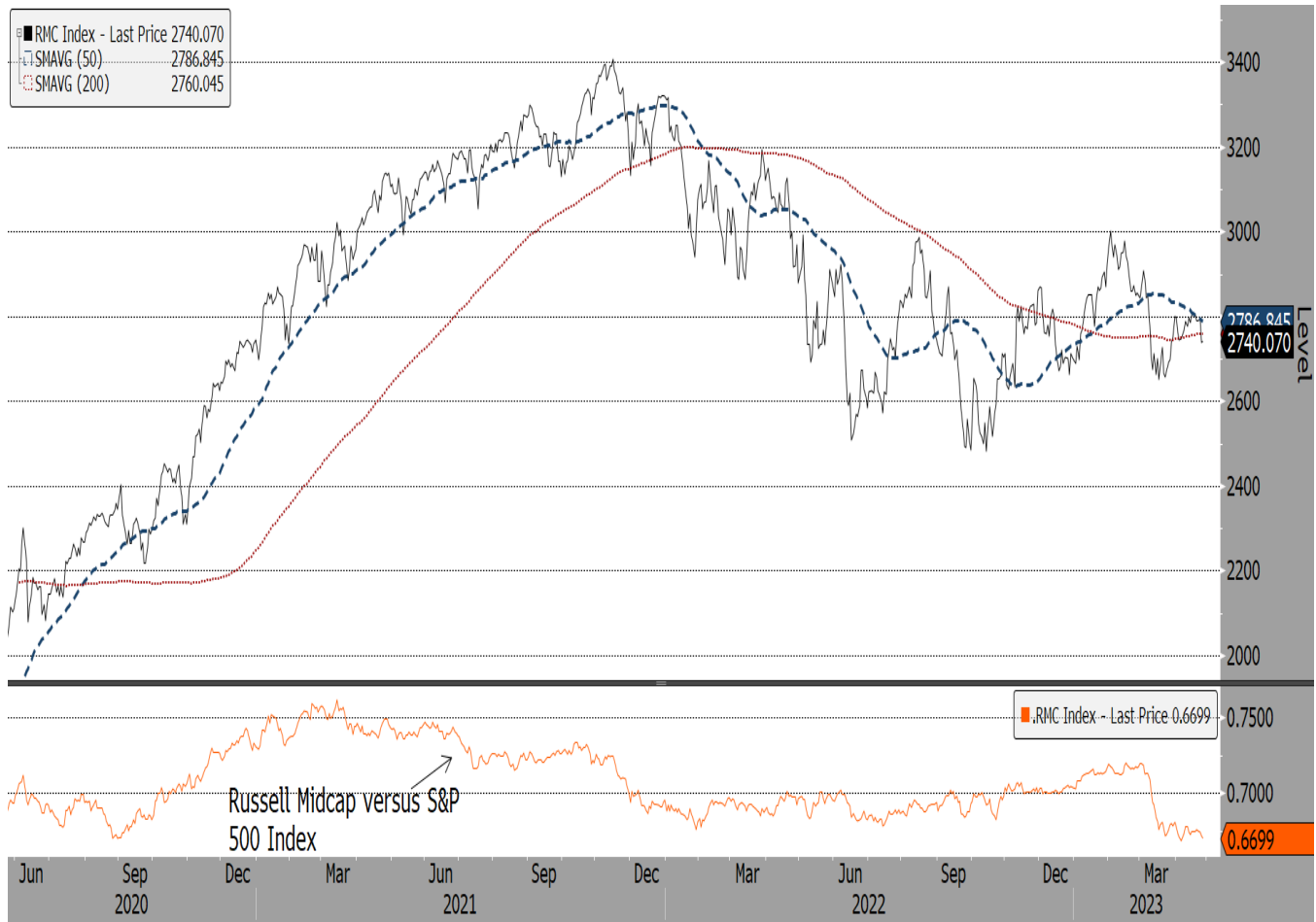
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Mid-Cap Equities

Mid-cap equities are pulling back on an absolute and relative basis.



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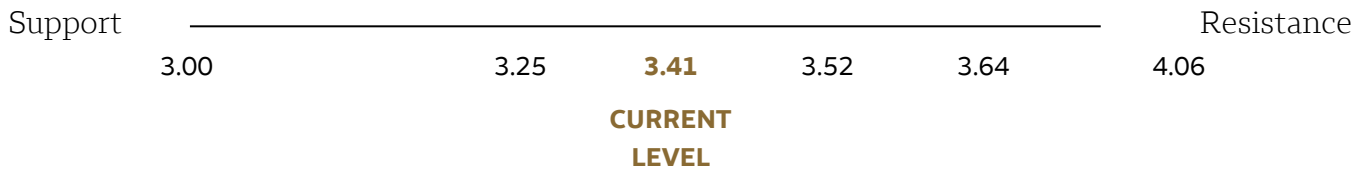
10-Year Treasury Yield

The 10-year Treasury yield (3.41) is in an uptrend. Resistance looks to come in next at the 200-day moving average (3.52), followed by the 50-day moving average (3.64), and recent highs (4.06, 4.24). Support on the way down will likely be found at psychologically important levels (3.25, 3.00).



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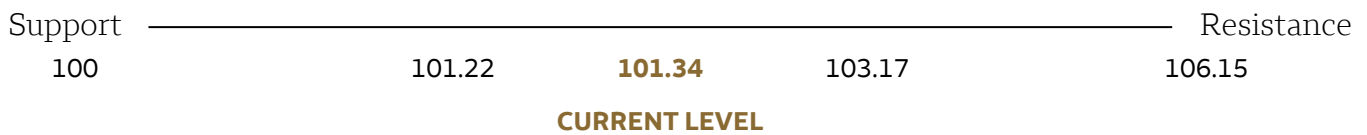
U.S. Dollar Index

The U.S. Dollar Index (101.34) is in a downtrend. Support should be found at the recent low (101.22) and the psychologically important 100 level. Resistance will likely be found at the 50-day moving average (103.17), followed by the 200-day moving average (106.15).



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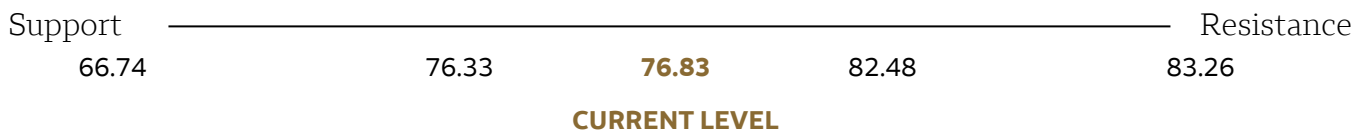
Crude Oil

Short-term trend: Lower

Crude oil (76.83) is in a downtrend. The next key levels to watch for support are the 50-day moving average (76.33), followed by the recent low (66.74). Resistance will likely be found at the 200-day moving average (82.48) and the recent high (83.26).



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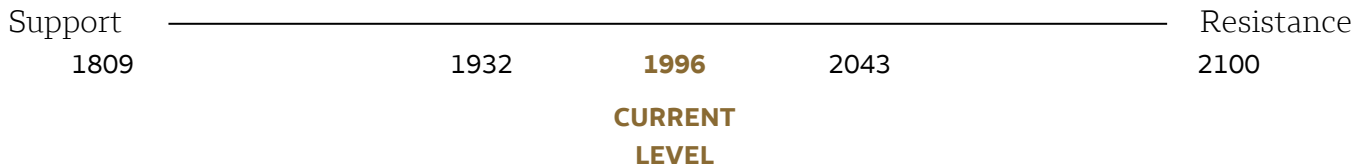
Gold

Gold (1996) is in an uptrend. Support should be found at the 50-day moving average (1932), followed by the recent low (1809). Resistance will likely be found at the recent high (2043) and psychologically important round numbers (2100, 2200).

The S&P 500 Materials sector (498) is pulling back on both an absolute and relative basis. We look for resistance to come in at the 50-day moving average (504) and recent highs (515, 537). Support will likely be found at the 200-day moving average (491) and recent lows (474).



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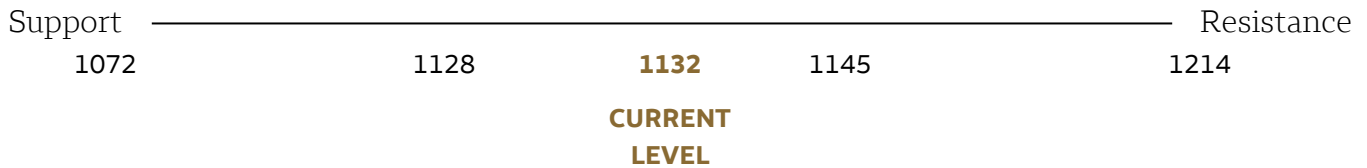
S&P 500 Consumer Discretionary Index

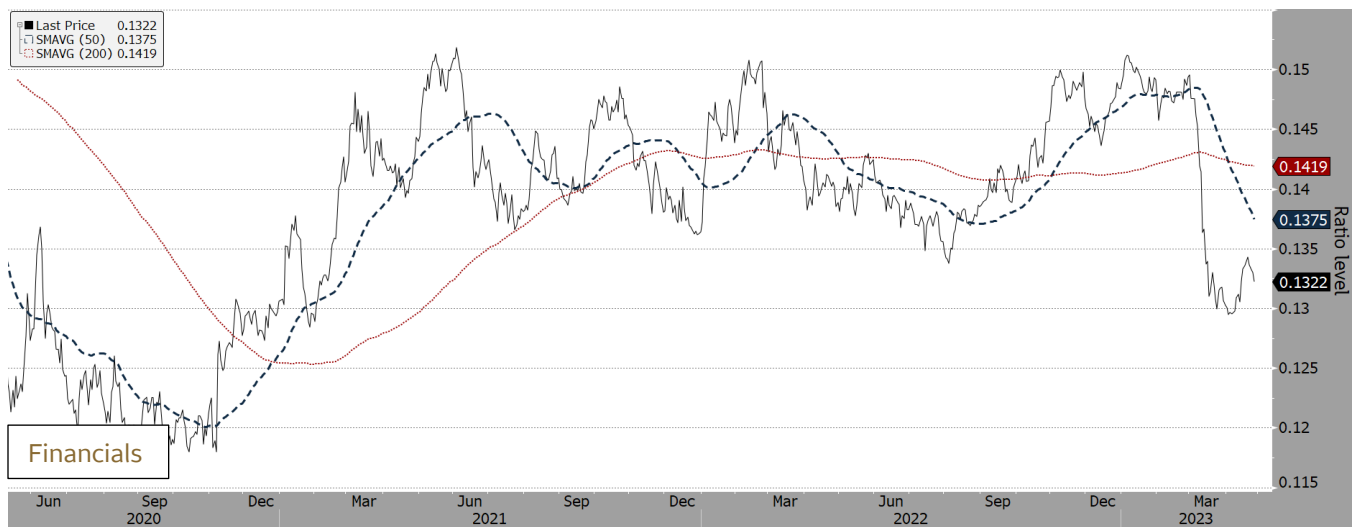
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Relative Sector Charts (vs. S&P 500)



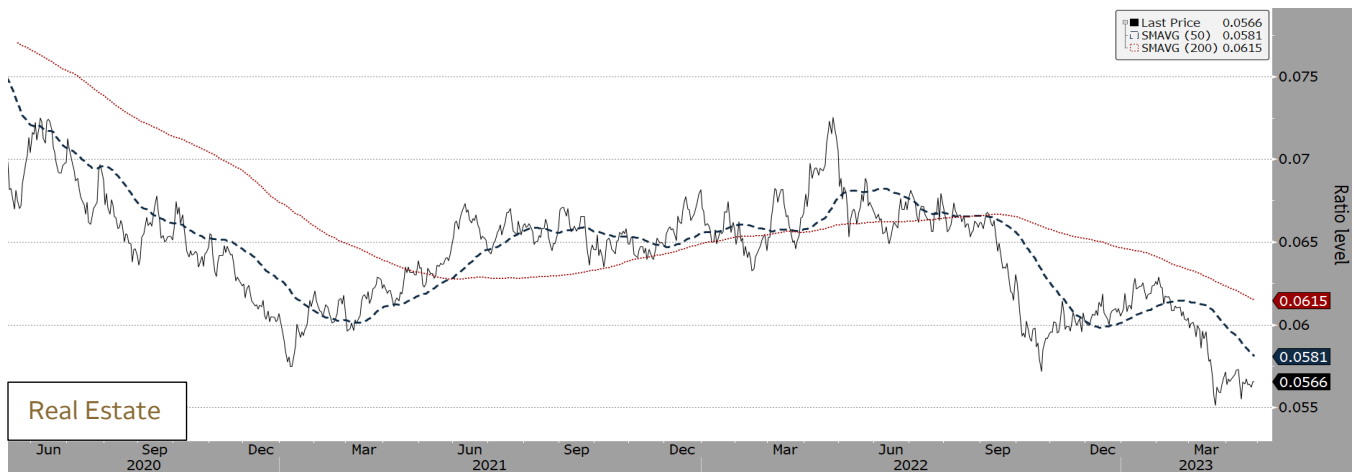
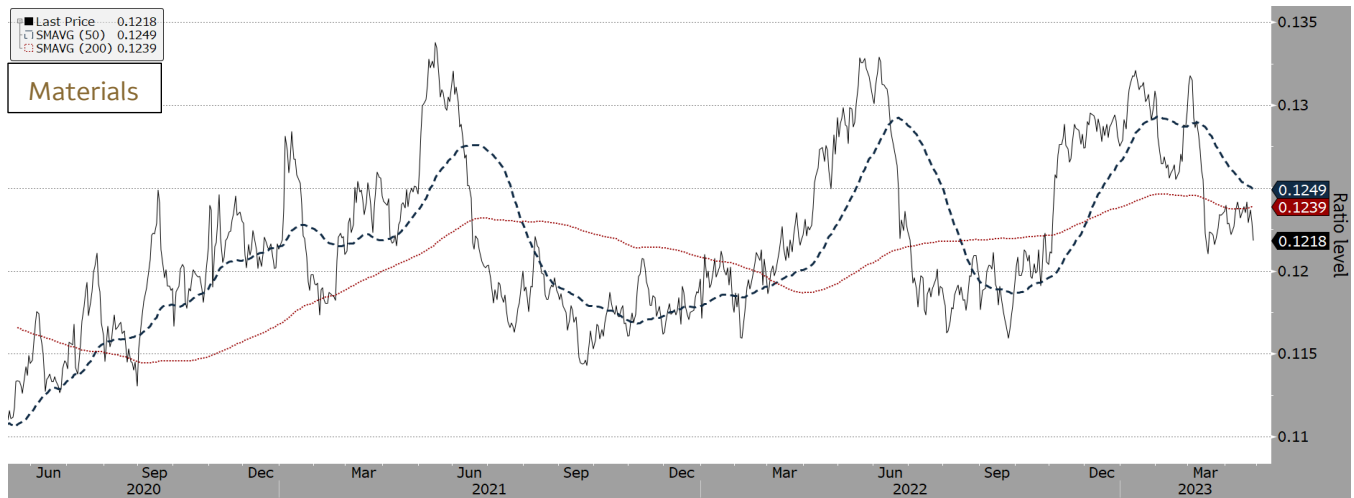
